5. What emotions are exhibited by each of <i>ABC</i> 's characters? How are they representative of that character?
6. Yang uses humor to poke fun at stereotypes. Have you or anyone you know had an experience that was funny to others but not to you? If possible, explain.
7. Why do you think the author uses a television show to tell the story of "Chin-Kee"?
8. Do you ever "pose" as someone else? Who and why?
9. What is your true identity?
10. What is your perception of people labeled "American born Chinese"?
11. The transformer toy in <i>American Born Chinese</i> represents the many alterations or transformations the characters go through in order to fit into American society. How do the characters "transform" themselves? How do you transform yourself to fit into the American mainstream?
12. If you had to predict Jin Wang's future, what do you think lies in store for him? Will he remain true to himself?
